FEES:

Exhibitor - Open: \$15.00 (required); admits one exhibitor. Additional passes are available for \$15.00.
Open Class Entry fees: \$1.00 for each entry.
Youth Entry fees: \$15.00 entry fee for youth, which covers up to ten (10) entries. **Any additional Youth entry over 10: \$1.00 for each additional entry.** Youth: Age for youth are 7 through 20 years of age as of January 1 of the current year.
If Youth is entering BOTH Open and Youth Classes, fees must be paid for both Open and Youth.
An entry fee will not be refunded if the entry is cancelled or not exhibited.
Parking: \$15.00 per weekend

RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE SHOW

Youth Exhibitor: Must be seven (7) years of age, but not over twenty (20) years of age as of January 1 of the current year. Date of birth must be on entry form. Open to Michigan youth only.

Open Exhibitor: Minimum age of twenty-one (21) years of age as of January 1 of the current year.

1. Agriculture Exhibitor Entry Form and current W-9 form (W-8 Canadian) must be filled out and returned.
2. **Fees must accompany your entry.**
3. All entries must be made in accordance with general terms and conditions. Please go to: www.MichiganStateFairLLC.com and enter online or mail to: MSFLLC, 46100 Grand River Ave., Novi, MI 48374, by August 1, 2022. There is a mandatory \$5.00 processing fee for all mail in entries.
LATE ENTRIES: Entries received between August 2, 2022, and August 7, 2022, will incur a \$50.00 Late Entry Fee.
4. If you choose to enter via mail, the entry must be post marked (no metered mail) by the above stated deadlines. Make check or money order payable to the "***Michigan State Fair LLC***" or complete valid credit card information and signature.
5. **CAMPING.** Camping **MUST BE** registered for **SEPERATELY**. Please use this link to apply:

6. A maximum of two (2) entries per class per exhibitor, except for entries in Apiary. Apiary entries will be limited to one (1) entry per class per exhibitor and two (2) entries per class per household. Exhibitor cannot enter the same item in more than one class.
7. Exhibits must be grown as a project of the exhibitor. Previously entered items and displays are ineligible.
8. Exhibitors must leave the Agriculture Building during judging.
9. All entries in this department must stay the entire length of the Fair. The superintendent will remove and dispose of any unsightly produce or exhibits considered to be unworthy of exhibition by the judge.
10. **RIBBONS AWARDED TO THIRD PLACE.** Only current Michigan State Fair LLC Ribbons may be displayed with exhibits. All others will be removed.

11. Exhibits cannot be sold in the Agriculture Building.
12. To keep exhibits fresh, spoiled produce will be disposed of at the discretion of the superintendent.
13. Judges shall not award prizes to unworthy exhibits, whether there is competition or not.

Michigan State Fair:

Code of Conduct for Exhibitors, Parents, Family Member(s), and Helpers

The management of the Michigan State Fair (MSF) is committed to providing a safe and respectful show environment and experience that respects the rights of each and every attendee. All exhibitors, parents and other spectators are expected to exhibit outstanding sportsmanship as well as abide by the standards of the Code of Conduct.

Policies for Human Conduct:

The MSF Code of Conduct requires attendees to refrain from the following:

- Behavior that is unruly, disruptive, or illegal in nature
- Direct interference or criticism with the show management and officials, judge, other exhibitors, or breed representatives before, during, or after the competitive event
- Intoxication or other signs of alcohol or substance impairment resulting in poor behavior
- Foul, obscene, threatening, offensive or abusive language, gestures or actions
- Interfering with the progress of the show
- Failing to follow the instructions of the show personnel
- Fighting or physical violence of any type
- Conduct that endangers any person
- Knowingly providing false or inaccurate exhibitor or animal information

Policies for Animal Treatment:

The MSF Code of Conduct requires that animals are not subjected or show signs to any of the following:

- Artificially changing the conformation or appearance by treating the animal, internally or externally, with any irritant, counter irritant, or any other substance
- Adding false hair, wool, or any other similar substance to any part of the animal unless it is allowed by equine and dairy standards
- Forced administration of fluid or substance to the animal that is not considered part of an accepted and normal livestock diet
- Administration of quantities of fluid, feed, or any other substance that is not considered normal
- Use of tranquilizers, sedatives, or depressants which alter the physical or behavioral state of the animal
- Improper care, feed, water, and husbandry of the animal
- Any animal that appears ill, unhealthy or shows any signs of communicable disease/s must be removed from the premise
- Any animal that is unmanageable or poses a safety hazard must be removed from the premise
- Physical abuse of an animal

Violators of this code of conduct, as well as their immediate family members and other helpers, will be subject to disciplinary action including but not limited to cancellations of all premiums and awards as well as suspension from current and future MSF events. The MSF management reserves to its Show Committee and superintendents the final and absolute right to interpret these

Rules and Regulations and settle and determine all matters, questions, and differences in regard to, or otherwise arising out of, connected with, or incident to the MSF.

Field Crops – Section 1

The display must be 16 square feet in size – 4 feet wide, 4 feet backdrop and 4 feet deep – and self-sustaining.

Exhibitors are encouraged to present exhibits of crops which are rarely on display. The public is greatly interested in the appearance of seed and plants of most farm crops. A display of such material is very educational and instructive.

The quality of the specimen used and the arrangement of the exhibit will be left to the discretion of the exhibitor. The plant specimen may be shown at any stage of development. Any farm crop may be selected.

The purpose of this exhibit is to bring together in one group the more important horticulture crops and their products which may be produced on the farm. The judge will place particular emphasis on the quality of the products as well as the general attractiveness of the display in making awards.

All samples are scored in order of best to poorest in flavor. One-quarter to one-half point is deducted from the score of each sample presenting less desirable flavor than the preceding.

Color

Full score is given to the lightest colored sample. All samples are scored in order of color, light to dark. One-tenth to one-quarter point is deducted from the score of each sample darker than the one preceding it.

Density

Two points is subtracted for every one-half degree below 66 degrees Brix. One point off is subtracted for every one-half degree above 66 degrees Brix.
